

LUBRICATION AND OTHER ITEMS RELATED TO SEXUAL HEALTH

Adequate lubrication is an important part of positive sexual interaction. Below are listed lubricants that are widely available. This does not attempt to be a complete list, but rather describes commonly used lubricants.

Types of lubricants:

- -Water based
- -Silicone based
- -Blend of water and silicone
- -Oils (use with caution)

Where do I find lubricants?

In drug stores, lubrication products are usually displayed near the pharmacy (prescriptions). Stores selling organic foods usually have a 'health' aisle. Often, you will find them located with other vaginal care and hygiene products. You can also check online at goodvibes.com, babeland.com, even the 'Vermont Country Store' catalog carries great lubes. Lubricants can also be purchased on Amazon, or google the brand and go to their website.

Listed are water-based lubricants and silicone lubricants and some blends.

The most readily accessible and often personally preferred lubricant is human saliva.

Caution: There are some ingredients in lubes that are not easily tolerate

-paraben -EDTA

-glycerin* -polyquaternium

-non-oxynol 9 -menthol -petroleum -capsaicin -chlorhexidine -herbal extracts

-propylene glycol

- -oils (like olive oil) can break down condoms and skin and can lead to bacterial infections.
- -AVOID fragrances as they can irritate the vaginal mucosa.



*Although not well researched, glycerin has been shown to increase the production of yeast and irritation in the vagina for some women. It is found in many water-based lubes.

Remember most lubes impair sperm motility, so if trying to conceive, Pre-Seed is considered best option.

Don't mix silicone lubes with silicone sex toys, it can cause the silicone in sex toys to deteriorate.

Paraben, glycerin and glycol free are preferred by many people.

Lubrication products are <u>not</u> contraceptives

Towels: When using new lubricants, some people are concerned about staining sheets. Spread a large dark colored beach towel on the bed before sexual activity begins.

Prone to yeast infections and UTIs: If using organic oils like olive oil or vulva balms for menopausal dryness, use cautiously until you figure out if you are prone to yeast infections or UTIs. Health care professionals advise caution with oils. The oil can get into the urethra and contribute to urinary tract and bladder infections. If prone to yeast infections, also avoid silicone lubricants and stay with water-based lubes.

LUBRICANTS

Place high on the list:

Water based

- ★ Jo: Lubricant with silicone option. Latex safe. Can be used as massage oil as well.
- ★ Good Clean Love: A product line of organic lubricants (goodcleanlove.com). Water based, glycerin and paraben free.
- ★ Sliquid Silver: Part of the Sliquid (well know name in lubricants) line. Water based, glycerin free, and hypoallergenic.
- ★ Sliquid Organics: These are glycerin and paraben free lubes. Quite a selection.



Silicone based:

★ **Uberlube** (www.uberlube.com) is great. Glycerin and paraben free. No fragrance. Can be used for dilator therapy too. Must be purchased at their website or through Amazon or drugstore.com

Water based

- ★ Astroglide: A long lasting, light lubrication that is odorless and flavorless. It is water soluble. Many like it because it is a long lasting lubricant that does not become "stringy." It is available by calling 1-800-325-5695. They can tell you if a local pharmacy carries it or you can mail order it directly from them. This company has a variety of lubes, some are glycerin free, and they even have a vaginal moisturizer.
- ★ Good Lubrications: From makers of Astroglide, but this is glycerin-free. Has the Astroglide slipperiness.
- ★ K-Y Jelly: Generally considered an all-purpose lubricant that many people have found helpful with a "medium" degree of thickness. Some report it comes out too fast and gets "gummy."
- ★ **KY Gel:** Preferred by some as less sticky than K-Y Jelly.
- ★ Liquid Silk: Glycerin-free. Comes in a pump, Odorless. Has a lotion-like feel.
- ★ Lubrin: A suppository. Many post-menopausal women find this a helpful lubricant because, since it is inserted into the vagina, it lasts longer. They indicate that it needs some time to melt inside the vagina because it is a suppository. For some women, they indicate that it is almost "too much" lubrication.
- ★ Moist Again: Natural feeling, lasting. 800.537.8658.
- ★ Natural Lubrication by Emerita. 800.455.5182. Available in "organic foods" type stores.
- ★ **Pre-Seed:** Vaginal lube and moisturizer for those couples trying to conceive. Sperm motility better. (Agarwal et al; Fertil Steril. 2008; 89:375-9).
- ★ Probe Silky Light Gentle: odorless, glycerin-free, taste-free, and paraben-free. Good for those with sensitivities. Probe Classic is thicker, but not glycerin-free.
- ★ Slippery Stuff Gel: Glycerin-free, taste-free, thicker lubricant. Also think about Sliquid. Many like slippery stuff.

Silicone Lubricant

Silicone lubricants don't dry out like water-based ones, but silicone lubes are 'very slippery' so be careful not to spill them on the shower/bathroom floor. These lubes can also do double duty as massage oil.



- ★ Uberlube (see above)
- ★ ID Millennium—Not water-soluble and has no glycerin. Good slipperiness.
- ★ Pink—A little 'thinner' than 'ID Millennium'. No glycerin. Also used as a moisturizer. Good slipperiness.

Natural alternatives

★ Vitamin E oil: Available in health food stores, preferred by some women for natural, non-irritating qualities. Can be ordered in suppository form with prescription--Carlson KEY-E suppositories, 30 IU vitamin E, non-laxative. Use one or more times daily in the vagina. As a lubricant, some people like "Jason's Natural Vitamin E Oil, 5,000 IU Pure Beauty Oil"(4 fl oz). Natural oils should not be used with condoms as they can weaken condom latex and cause tears or disintegration of the condom. Some women report extra virgin olive oil works well—remember the UTI/yeast infection caution above.

'NO ESTROGEN' VAGINAL MOISTURIZERS

- ★ Luvena: prebiotic moisturizer and lubricant. Women who choose not or cannot use localized estrogen replacement to the vagina often use this vaginal gel. It does not dissolve too quickly. Reduces sensation of vaginal dryness or irritation.
- ★ **KY Liquibeads:** Similar properties to Luvena. They cost about the same.

SPERMICIDAL GELS

Remember that a spermicidal gel has a distinctly chemical taste, so it is not preferred for oral sex. These gels were designed for diaphragm use. They may also irritate when used on external genitalia like the vulva.

CONDOMS Latex condoms prevent spread of HIV or STD's.

Consumer Reports rates Durex Ultra Sensitive Lubricated #1. Lifestyles Ultra Sensitive Lubricated was also top ranked.

At Consumer Reports on the web you can check these out as well as non-lubricated, non-latex, and delayed ejaculation choices.

Lifestyles SKYN is a nonlatex alternative for those allergic to latex. SKYN is like an ultrathin and has no taste/odor.



Oils (e.g. baby oil, Vaseline, and cold cream) weaken the latex of a condom and can cause tears or disintegration of the condom. Use only water-based lubricants or spermicidal gels with condoms.
